## Policy In Place: Revisiting Canada's Tri-Level Agreements

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This paper revisits Canada's history of successful trilevel agreements between federal, provincial/ territorial, and municipal governments on issues from homelessness to economic development and infrastructure. It argues that these agreements offer a model for place-based federalism – a bottom-up form of policymaking that includes all orders of government, including municipalities. Implementing this model could help Canada effectively address climate change, the COVID-19 recovery, and more. **The paper offers** <u>six principles</u> to inform the design and implementation of future agreements.

*Conduct a readiness test* to determine if partners have sufficient (good) will and capacity to work together.

*Take intelligent risks* to make new connections, explore different approaches, and test unproven solutions.

*Scale policy innovations* and facilitate lesson-drawing from the front lines into the upper echelons of policy development.

*Plan for transitions* by identifying spinoff partnerships, additional revenue streams, or policy scale-ups.

*Forge learning networks* that connect actors across levels, sectors, and sites for comparative learning.
