It Takes Three: Making Space for Cities in Canadian Federalism

Challenges:

Paternalism: Cities face unnecessary or too stringent oversight over their decision making.

Constrained finances: A mismatch exists between a city's responsibilities and its ability to pay for them.

Poor coordination: There is a lack of clarity on provincial and municipal responsibilities due to overlapping jurisdiction or unclear cost-sharing.

Fragmentation: A lack of adequate governance structures prevents coordination among cities in a metropolitan region.

Solutions:

Clarify the powers and responsibilities of cities, and ensure they have the resources to meet their responsibilities.

Deepen federal-provincial-municipal relations by creating formal avenues for regular collaboration and agreements to address shared policy challenges.
